

Getting a subsidised training place

Currently the South Australian Government is offering more opportunities for you to enrol in a course on the Subsidised Training List.

This means if you are eligible for a subsidised place:

you can access courses regardless of your prior qualifications you can undertake more than one course or short course any training completed during this period will not impact on your entitlement to access a subsidised training place.


National Skill Sets and Local Skill Sets

There is currently no limit on how many national skill sets or local skill sets an eligible student can access.


Industry Pathways
